



The Jean Tweed Centre Integrated Care Initiative Broadview Avenue Project Site

The Integrated Care Initiative offers trauma-informed and gender-specific withdrawal management support, intensive, residential substance use treatment, and transitional housing for women with substance use concerns. All services are offered in one-location for easy and supportive transitions along the recovery journey.

WHY THIS INITIATIVE IS NEEDED



Although women initiate drug and alcohol use at an older age, compared to men, they tend to develop substance use disorders faster. They also experience significantly greater physical, psychological, and social harms from substance use, and are more likely to have histories of trauma.



Women also face significant gendered barriers to accessing treatment and supports for substance use concerns, including income inequality, childcare responsibilities, fear of involvement of child protective services, and stigma.2




Women need comprehensive, gender-specific, integrated, and often long-term treatment and services to overcome these gendered impacts of substance use and barriers to support.

CONTINUUM OF CARE

WITHDRAWAL MANAGEMENT



- Flexible length of stay to respond to women's needs
- Seamless transition to the Intensive Substance Use Program

INTENSIVE SUBSTANCE USE PROGRAM

- 10 beds available to women in need
- 4-weeks of intensive counselling, group, education, and 24/7 support designed specifically for women
- Services integrate evidence based treatment interventions (e.g., Cognitive and Dialectical Behavioural Therapy) with skill building and psychoeducation

TRANSITIONAL SUPPORT

- Beds for women who have completed the intensive program to support their transition into the community
- Familiar and safe accommodations, including counselling and nutritious meals.
- Access to wrap-around services including trauma programming, 2 years of continuing care, the child development centre, transitional and permanent housing.

No more missed opportunities to engage and support women to transition to intensive substance use treatment following withdrawal management



Women have access to **comprehensive, gender-specific, wrap-around supports,** including trauma-specific services, primary health care, child development, and long-term substance use supports.



New initiative has cut the wait for existing residential treatment beds by over half.
